Dear Citizens,

Another autumn season is behind us as we get ready to usher out a pivotal year in the Village. *Celebrate Grafton*, a new non-profit charged with organizing and running community events—including the Giro d’Grafton, Fall Pumpkin Festival and the first Cyclocross—had a successful year. We look forward to even more activities in 2010. The Paramount Blues Festival, a production of the Grafton Blues Association, paid their fourth annual tribute to Grafton’s musical heritage. We salute those organizations and the Grafton Area Chamber of Commerce for their commitment to community events.

The Village Board ratified the 2010 budget at the beginning of November. I am pleased to report that the Village’s portion of your tax bill shows the lowest tax levy increase in 10 years. The 1.5 percent increase, mostly due to previously negotiated labor contracts, translates to approximately \$20 on a \$200,000 home. I urge you to visit the [Village’s web site](#) for budget details.

Although the creation of the annual budget is one of the most important tasks we undertake, this year the future of the Bridge Street Dam also takes center stage. By the time you read this, the decision to keep or remove the dam may be settled. I want to provide some personal reasons on why I think the controversy over the issue is encouraging from a Village branding perspective.

Several years ago when it became apparent that the downtown “brick and mortar” redevelopment effort was gathering momentum, I felt it was important to create a stronger sense of community identity in order to sustain the efforts and investments being made. I started a branding committee and assigned it to our economic development organization called EDGE to oversee. The reason for this is that EDGE is represented by the Village, Town, Grafton School District and Chamber. Branding is a sense of being and all these stakeholders have a vested interest. A branding subcommittee of EDGE was created to start the process creating that sense of community.

Significant results of this effort are the new logo and a tag line that reads “Quality Life. Naturally.” From this effort, the Village has since created a sustainability committee dedicated to preserving and promoting conservation, recycling and educating in the concepts of going “green” and living a more natural life. The branding committee has engaged the Grafton School District in getting students involved in the community and has identified activities downtown and in the community that support the concept of “Quality Life. Naturally.” EDGE and its representation endorse the concepts of branding as it will create that self-sustaining sense of self which is needed to be a successful community.

As the branding effort has been implemented over the last several years, it is clear to me that the barometer of its initial success can be measured in the controversy over the Bridge Street Dam. Clearly, the concept of removing the dam represents a fundamental shift towards accepting the natural component of the brand. As recent as two years ago, I believe the thought of the dam removal would not have generated much support, yet today we find that residents are divided on the subject.

The other encouraging result of this issue is the fact that residents and businesses are becoming more involved in issues that affect the fabric of the community. I take this as a positive sign that the branding effort is paying off and the growing "sense of community" is taking hold. When residents can create and communicate a consistent message of what Grafton means to them, branding will have succeeded.

Although we have a ways to go, I believe that however the Bridge Street Dam issue is resolved, the newly created tag line of "Quality Life. Naturally." is now a firm part of the community of Grafton's psyche. It will grow over time to a point whereby issues such as removing a dam will be considered in the context of living the brand and is it "natural?"

ELECTION NEWS VOTING LOCATION CHANGE

Village staff has been working with the Grafton School District to find a voting location that will meet our current and future site needs. In order to continue to have one polling location which makes it easier for residents, it was decided to move from the current location at the Grafton High School.

Beginning with the 2010 election schedule, all residents in the Village of Grafton will vote in the new (west) gymnasium at John Long Middle School, 700 Hickory Street. The change to this location will provide better access to the polls, and on-site and street parking will provide more parking options. The proximity of the poll location to the adjacent residential area will also allow some residents to walk to the polls.

Thank you for your patience during the transition from the current location to the new voting site.

BINDING AND ADVISORY REFERENDUM QUESTIONS

The April 6, 2010 ballot will also include two referendum questions regarding the Bridge Street Dam.

The binding referendum question:

It is hereby resolved by the Village Board of the Village of Grafton that the Bridge Street Dam be preserved until at least 2019 (the year by which any potential modifications necessary to bring the dam into compliance with the requirements of Wis. Adm. Code NR333 would have to be completed), unless ordered to take action earlier under state law, in order to allow a comprehensive, independent analysis thoroughly evaluating all reasonable, cost-effective alternatives to comply with state law pertaining to dams, given:

- (i) The irreversible nature of the dam's removal prior to such an analysis;
- (ii). The dam's aesthetic importance as a Grafton landmark;
- (iii). The many recreational opportunities the dam affords;
- (iv) The uncertainties regarding the economic impact dam removal may have upon public and private property adjacent to the Milwaukee River and the community at large; and
- (v) The historical significance of the dam.

This Resolution does not prohibit the construction of a fish ladder.

The advisory referendum question:

If there are Village costs associated with the removal, repair, replacement or modification of the Bridge Street Dam, do you wish those costs to be:

1. A general Village tax increase; or
2. The costs absorbed by Tax Incremental District No. 3 (Downtown).

EVERY VOTE COUNTS – BE SURE YOURS IS INCLUDED.

SNOW & ICE REMOVAL

Snow and ice removal from sidewalks by property owners is required by Village Ordinance. Snow and ice **MUST** be removed by 10:00 p.m. on the day following the snowfall. **Snow may NOT be thrown, blown, or plowed into or across the roadway.**

The penalty for not removing snow and ice is \$50 - \$200 plus the cost of prosecution for EACH offense.

WINTER PARKING

Winter parking is in effect from December 1 until April 1. There is 30 minute parking on all Village streets from 2:00 a.m. until 7:00 a.m. No parking is allowed during a snow emergency. If you have a special need for a vehicle to be parked on the street overnight, you may call the Police Department for one night permission at 375-5320. Permission may be granted, dependent on weather conditions.

SNOW EMERGENCY

The declaration of a snow emergency by the Village President occurs when:

1. The safety of the citizens is at risk; and
2. To enable effective snow removal operations by the Department of Public Works.

This winter, please be alert to "Snow Emergency" situations and take appropriate measures. All vehicles must be removed from all Village streets in a snow emergency.

You can check the Village cable station 14 for up-to-date information when severe weather is in progress.

WATER / SEWER RATE NEWS

In follow-up to a comprehensive review of its rates, the Water & Wastewater Utility has requested increases to both water and sewer charges to general service customers in 2010. The request will include a 16.4 percent increase in water revenues and a 19.2 percent increase in sewer revenues. The purpose for the increase is to offset increased water and wastewater operation and maintenance expenses, decreased water sales and increased debt service as a result of major improvement projects over the last four years. The new rates will also generate more cash to pay for routine infrastructure replacement projects without adding to debt service. The typical customer will notice an approximate \$7.07 per quarter increase in the water charges and a \$12.82 per quarter increase in the sewer portion of utility billing charges. The Utility anticipates approval and authorization of new rates by the Wisconsin Public Service Commission in December. If this occurs, the new water and sewer rates will take effect by or before January 1, 2010. Residential customers will receive their first billing under the new rates shortly after March 31, 2010. The Utility's last comprehensive rate increase took place in 2005.

CHRISTMAS TREES

The Village is once again promoting the recycling of Christmas trees.

Please remove items such as tinsel, lights, ornaments, wire or nails and any other hardware prior to placing your tree out for chipping.

The Department of Public Works will collect Christmas trees placed at the curb on or before January 15, 2010. Trees may also be brought to the Hickory Street yard Monday - Friday 7:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m.

All Christmas wreaths and garland must be disposed of with your weekly trash collection. Due to the materials these items are made of they cannot be chipped or placed in the compost pile.

TAX PAYMENT OPTIONS

Please read these instructions carefully to avoid problems in making a timely tax payment.

The tax bill that you receive in the mail in December will be the only one you receive. No additional reminder bills will be sent. The new bill will have tear-off stubs should you elect to pay in installments. Please include a stub with each payment that you make. This will help insure that your payment will be applied to your tax bill properly. Tax bills will not be mailed to lending institutions on mortgaged properties. If you have an escrow account, it is your

responsibility to contact your lending institution to make the necessary arrangements for the payment of the taxes. The official U.S. postmark will determine whether your payment is timely. **A receipt will not be mailed unless a self-addressed stamped envelope is included with your payment.**

OPTION 1: FULL PAYMENT

Under this option, full payment must be made on or before January 31, 2010. All personal property taxes, special assessments, and special charges appearing on the bill must be paid in full on or before January 31, 2010.

OPTION 2: INSTALLMENT PAYMENT

Under this option, the first installment must be made on or before January 31, 2010. The amount of the first installment shall be, at a minimum, the sum of all special assessments and special charges and one half of the real property taxes, less any lottery credit. An additional 25 percent of the real property taxes will be due on or before March 31, 2010, with the remaining balance due on May 31, 2010. If the first installment of real property taxes is not paid on or before January 31, 2010, the entire amount of the remaining unpaid balance is delinquent as of February 1. If the second or any subsequent installment payment is not paid by the due date specified, the entire amount of the unpaid balance is delinquent with interest and penalty calculated from February 1.

Taxes may be paid at Village Hall, Bank Mutual, Cornerstone Community Bank, Harris Bank, or Port Washington State Bank. If business hours are inconvenient for you, a drop box is located at the entrance to Village Hall. Any payment placed in the Village Hall drop box before midnight will be credited for that business day.

If you are paying with an escrow check, remember **all** individuals listed as co-payees must endorse the check. If your escrow check exceeds the amount of taxes due, a refund check will be mailed to you in approximately five working days from date of payment if you pay your taxes at Village Hall.

If your escrow check is larger than your tax bill, you may make payment at one of the banks to receive an immediate refund.

PAYMENTS BY CREDIT CARD

The Village of Grafton has contracted with Official Payments to offer customers the option of paying their taxes by credit card. Payments can be made at www.officialpayments.com. Official Payments Corp. does **charge a convenience fee** for this service. The convenience fee is based on the dollar amount of the taxes that are paid.



WHAT YOU GET FOR YOUR VILLAGE TAX DOLLARS

Where do my Village tax dollars go? Less than one third of your total property tax payment (30 percent) is used to pay for all Village of Grafton provided services. Budgets of other taxing jurisdictions, including Ozaukee County, Grafton School District, Cedarburg School District, Milwaukee Area Technical College, and the State of Wisconsin also impact your taxes. Costs shown are based on a home assessed value of \$250,000. This home would pay \$1,594 for its Village of Grafton services. Figures are based on the 2010 adopted Village of Grafton Budget and the portion of the budget supported by property taxes net of other sources of revenue.

Police Protection. Twenty-two sworn police officers and six telecommunicators keep Grafton safe around the clock. Activities include traffic enforcement, crime investigation and education programs.	\$ 576
Public Works / Engineering. Includes maintenance programs such as storm sewer maintenance, pothole patching, street cleaning, traffic light maintenance, snow removal, flood control, street painting and weed cutting. The Engineering Division provides design, maintenance and rehabilitation of infrastructure and community facilities.	\$ 227
Debt Service. Includes debt payments for prior year capital projects. Types of projects include the Wisconsin Avenue reconstruction project, and infrastructure improvements.	\$ 191

SUMMER SEWER CREDIT ENDS

The Water Department would again like to remind all residents that the summer sewer/sprinkling credit ended with the October 1 billing. For periods of service billed December 31 and March 31, the actual volume of water used will be billed fully at the effective water and sewer rates. No credit is given for water used which does not enter the sanitary sewer system. This change can result in a slightly higher than expected bill in January, if for example, a homeowner waters trees or shrubs in late September or October.

ADOPT A HYDRANT

If your property has a fire hydrant located adjacent to it, please assist the Grafton Water Department and Grafton Fire Department this winter by keeping it clear from snow.

By clearing the snow, you will be performing an important community service which is greatly appreciated by the Village and all who depend upon that hydrant for public fire protection.

CLOUDY DRINKING WATER?

Have you ever noticed cloudy water in your glass after "drawing" a full one from the tap? This is nothing to be concerned about. The cloudy water is caused by air bubbles in the water similar to gas bubbles in beer or soda. After a short while, the bubbles rise to the top and the water clears. Although Grafton utilizes ground water which varies little in temperature, cloudiness generally occurs more often in the winter when drinking water may be colder.

TREATMENT PLANT IMPROVEMENTS UPDATE

In March 2008, the Village awarded a \$1,117,900 contract to August Winter & Sons, Inc. for construction/installation of new biosolids mixing improvements. These improvements were designed to upgrade and improve the effectiveness of the biosolids treatment process and the consistency of storage tank solids. The project also included refurbishing of 25 year old digester tank covers and other improvements to upgrade the overall safety of hazardous areas associated with the digestion process. All construction activity is now complete, and the project was closed out at \$14,060 under the bid amount. This project adds another 20 years of service life to the existing digester facilities and was a great value project for the dollars spent.
